When was that last time your school hosted an ICAIA conference? For some of us, it might have been last semester or maybe a year or two ago. For others, it has been some time and yet some have never hosted. If you have hosted in the past, you know what type of work is needed. The next time should only be easier. If you have not hosted, talk to those who have recently hosted and ask for help. With a little planning and some organizational skills, hosting a conference can be a very rewarding experience. Student Retention

What activities are you providing for students beyond the classroom? As the number of other available high-tech jobs continues to grow, we are constantly in a battle for students in our industry. Most of our schools provide support of student run organizations. Offer to help your students start a club with a focus on automotive technology. Provide an open house for the public to come and see what your students are doing. Host fall or spring car care clinics and allow students to assist the public with items, such as, how to evaluate their car's condition. Start a Skills – USA chapter and encourage your students to compete against other schools. Ask your students what they want to do and then help them. Showing a student you care about what they are doing is one of the most important keys to student retention.

All of these suggestions take time. This type of time spent with our students is not often the time we are paid for, but it will be some of the most rewarding experiences that you and your students will remember.

Coming Up Short

As a member of the ICAIA, and as an active recruiter for our automotive programs at Parkland College, I have been telling prospective students that there is a shortage of at least 60,000 service technicians in America today. I'm sure many of us received reinforcement of that statistic just a few weeks ago when USA Today ran an article on the Auto Technician shortage (August 29, 2001). But, I wonder if the ranks of us who are talking shortage of technicians aren't becoming smaller, too! According to the Illinois State Board of Education, Research Division, report to the Governor and the General Assembly dated December 2000 there is going to be a shortage of teachers in Illinois. According to the report, "The Illinois public school system is served by an aging staff. The average age of teachers was 44 years and nearly 40% were at least 50 years old." As I look around the room at our semi-annual banquets I see that the same statistic, which characterizes the Illinois Public Secondary schools, must be parallel to that of the post-secondary system.

The ISBE report continues to reveal that the "Illinois public school enrollments have been increasing since 1990 and that trend is expected to continue through 2008," with the increase expected to be the greatest (16%) at the secondary level. This would indicate to us that the post secondary level pool of prospective students should continue to be good for at least the next ten years.

In September 2000, there were 2,637 teaching positions unfilled due to lack of qualified teachers in the areas that there are shortages. There are students graduating from Illinois' universities with teaching certificates, 13,000 last year, but only 6,655 were hired by Illinois Public Schools. There are some areas that have a greater shortage than the Industrial Occupations, but teachers of automotive technology are considered to be in short demand. In

the disciplines of Industrial Occupations and Vocational Education, the ISBE reported a total of 2,039 secondary educators in 2000. Based upon potential retirements and increased student populations, the report estimates a need of 790 new secondary level educators in those disciplines within the next three years! If we can project that similar needs might apply to post secondary educators as well, we indeed are coming up short! Where will these educators come from? What are we doing as an association to insure that there will be teachers of automotive technology when we retire? Shouldn't we, as an organization, develop a plan to support teacher education in our own discipline?
